App of the week: Music Notes Decks - Music Flash Cards



Learn the basics of Music Theory with this notation flash card app. This useful app allows the user to learn note letter names in the treble and bass clef as well as many musical notation symbols.

Website of the week: BandLab for Education



BandLab is a free education platform for creating and collaborating through music. BandLab for Education, from BandLab Technologies, lets students and teachers work together on tablets and computers to make music and develop their understanding of music production.

The web-based platform runs on Mac, Windows, Linux and Chromebooks. The education edition includes:

- 100 virtual instruments, from synthesisers to wind instruments
- Access to over 2000 MIDI and audio loops
- Support for MIDI hardware including live recordings with instruments or microphones
- Teacher tutorials

BandLab for Education also allows teachers to set musical assignments that can be tracked and marked online. This is an excellent musical resource that really focuses upon the importance of Music Technology in the classroom.

Join Nigel Pilkington and Suki, the ship's monkey, as they set sail in search of buried treasure...and enjoy plenty of songs along the way!

Sun, sea and song is a music series of lessons based around the theme of the sea and can be used to support various Key Stage 1 topics such as - The Seaside, Under the Sea and Pirates.

There are seven sea-themed songs to learn, including a number of traditional favourites, and each song is accompanied by a musical activity, an episode of a traditional story and a piece of music to listen to and evaluate.

Other useful links(KS2): What are pulse and rhythm? - BBC Ten Pieces



If you are starting to explore music it's helpful to know about pulse and rhythm. They're the foundations to every song.

Pulse is a steady beat like a ticking clock or your heartbeat. It can be measured in time by counting the number of beats per minute (BPM).

Rhythm is the pattern of long and short sounds as you move through the song.

Anna Meredith is a composer and performer. Watch her introduce her body percussion piece 'Connect It'.

The Chrome Music Lab is a website that makes learning music more accessible through fun, hands-on experiments. Many teachers have been using Chrome Music Lab as a tool in their classrooms to explore music and its connections to science, maths, art, and more.

The Chrome Music Lab allows you to compose rhythmic loops using the Song Maker section of the website. To make a song, add notes by clicking the grid. MIDI keyboards can be used or you can sing notes into your microphone. Songs can be shared using a link.
