SHOOTING STAR!

**Dynamic defender
Asmita helps steer
England through
European qualifiers**

HIGHAM Lane's very own shooting star is rapidly making her presence felt on the international football scene.

Asmita Ale, 11L1, who is on Aston Villa's books, is an integral part of the England Under-17 Women's team, and played in all

three games at the UEFA European Qualifying Tournament, held during October.

In the first fixture of the three-match competition, the dynamic central defender helped steer her side to an emphatic 10-0 victory over hosts, Latvia, captain Lauren James, of Arsenal, leading the way with four goals while York City's Jessica Park fired in a hat-trick. Hannah Griffin (FC Saarbrücken), Ebony Salmon (Aston Villa) and substitute Annabel Blanchard (Liverpool) added one apiece to complete the demolition job! However, following a solid performance, Asmita was given the 'player of the match' award!

During the one-sided game, contested in

the Latvian capital, Riga, the young Lionesses registered a quite remarkable 58 shots on target!

The next match saw the England starlets taking on Slovakia, and the talented team notched up a convincing 6-0 success thanks to two strikes each from Salmon and James plus singles by Griffin and Jhamat (Liverpool).

Unsurprisingly, the third and final tie of the tournament saw Asmita and her team-mates going into the game full of confidence against an unbeaten Scotland side, and once again kept a clean sheet as they triumphed 3-0 thanks to goals from Blanchard and Park (2).

The three victories placed England firmly at the top of the

group, having scored a total of 19 goals without conceding, which earned the team a coveted place in November's draw for the UEFA European Elite Round.

This resulted in the girls being drawn out of the hat in Group 5, alongside Switzerland, Slovenia and Norway, the latter country hosting the tournament between March 25-31 next year.

The top three finishers in the Elite finals will qualify for the 2018 FIFA Under-17 World Cup, to be held in Uruguay during November and December.

We wish Asmita continued success in her international football career and hope to see her in South America!

School rises to The Challenge and receives Silver award!

HIGHAM Lane's continued work with The Challenge has resulted in the School receiving a Silver Award at organisation's 2017 presentation evening.

The Challenge is a major provider for the National Citizen Service, and acknowledged the fantastic input Higham Lane has had in inspiring students to greater achievements.

During the summer, a fifth of Year 11 students gave up two weeks of the holidays to work together with volunteers from other schools in Warwickshire and Birmingham to make improvements to the local community. As a result, 52 students graduated from NCS this year, making it the town's 'Champion School'.

Headteacher, Mr Kelly, attended November's presentation, held at the Jury's Inn in Birmingham, and proudly received the award on behalf of Nuneaton's top performing school.

Receiving praise was Mrs Mitchell, Subject Leader for CPSHEEd, who has worked tirelessly in promoting the ethos of The Challenge with students in recent years.

Her efforts were acknowledged in the award's accompanying speech:-

"The Challenge and this school in Nuneaton have had a long lasting partnership, beginning back in 2011. Emma Mitchell, Leader of CPSHE is well respected by staff and students alike and she has worked hard in support of NCS

events within the school for the past two years. Such events include: an hour-long interactive NCS assembly, Aspiration themed PSHE sessions for the whole year group and a T-shirt handout event. This school was also selected for the

local social media competition, with students managing to get several likes on Facebook. All of these efforts led to 52 students going on to graduate from NCS in summer this year; making this the top performing school in Nuneaton."

He went on to study English and Drama at the University of Wales, Aberystwyth, and subsequently trained at the Royal Central School of Speech and Drama, gaining a Post-Graduate Diploma in Musical Theatre.

Following a short spell as an actor, Matt has spent the past 13 years working for Universal Pictures, where he is now an International Publicity Director.

Matt has worked on the international publicity campaigns for a wide variety of films from Bridget Jones' Baby, Mamma Mia! and Les Miserables to The Danish Girl, The Fast and Furious films and the Despicable Me franchise.

No stranger to the international film festivals of Cannes and Berlin, Matt most recently launched the publicity campaign for Victoria & Abdul at the Venice Film Festival,



fulfilling a lifetime's dream of working with Dame Judi Dench.

His career has taken him all over the world, working as far afield as Los Angeles, New York and Rio de Janeiro, plus numerous world tours including Australia, Japan and Europe.

As a tonic to the glitz and glamour of the red carpet, Matt is a keen member of the Royal Horticultural Society (RHS) and can regularly be found in his garden trying to emulate the skills of Monty Don!

He is also a keen runner, and proudly ran the London Marathon for Oxfam, raising over £2,500 in the process.

THIS year's Armistice Day commemorations (November 11) fell on a Saturday, while a School Inset day, scheduled for the previous day, resulted in Higham Lane paying its deepest respects to the fallen and injured two days in advance.

At the 11th hour, of the 9th day, of the 11th month, the School was hushed for two minutes' silence in honour of the heroic service men and women who have laid down their lives for our great country.

Silence descended on corridors and a cloak of quietness replaced the usual hustle and bustle of the playground at break time as students and staff remembered the gallant

soldiers, sailors and airmen who have paid the ultimate sacrifice over the years. Then, on the following Sunday, a poppy wreath was laid at the War Memorial in Riversley Park during Nuneaton's Remembrance Service commemorations.

Representing the School was Headteacher, Mr Kelly, who was joined by Head Boy and Head Girl, Tommy and Anna, along with Sixth Form representatives Max and Jack.

As in recent years, the event was blessed with bright early winter sunshine as the Higham Lane contingent joined other schools, organisations and businesses in saluting our country's heroes for their bravery through the years.

TWO Higham Lane Sixth Form students represented the school in the North Warwickshire round of the Great Debate against two other schools from the area — Nuneaton's King Edward VI College and Leicester Grammar School.

Hosted by the Nuneaton branch of the Historical Society, the title of the debate — 'Was the 1918 extension of the vote to women the most significant moment in British democratic history?' — proved to be a huge topic which contained several big issues.

The quality of the debating was superb and the two HL6 students were in excellent form. Abigail Edmunds impressed the judges with the high quality of her argument, and also her confidence to argue with one of the judges — Alex Begbie, a retired headteacher from Kenilworth!

Jack Gunn was magnificent and also engaged with the audience and three judges — Mr Begbie, Shirley Robinson (one of the Historical Society organisers) and Rob Tromans (Assistant Police and Crime Commissioner for Warwickshire). His argument was well-researched, well-argued and, above all, powerful.

Both students were fantastic! It was really pleasing to see the confidence, and it was no surprise that Jack was crowned the winner

He will now go on to represent the

region in the National Finals at the House of Commons in March 2018, a special venue to mark the centenary of the important Parliamentary Act of 1918 that gave votes to women for the first time and also all adult men.

I would like to express my thanks and admiration for these two students who

represented Higham Lane School so superbly.

The competition is an annual event, and hopefully two more budding public speakers will be inspired to take part next year.

Wow, Year 8! Keep up the excellent work, we look forward to your next projects on the 'Days that shook the world' in January.

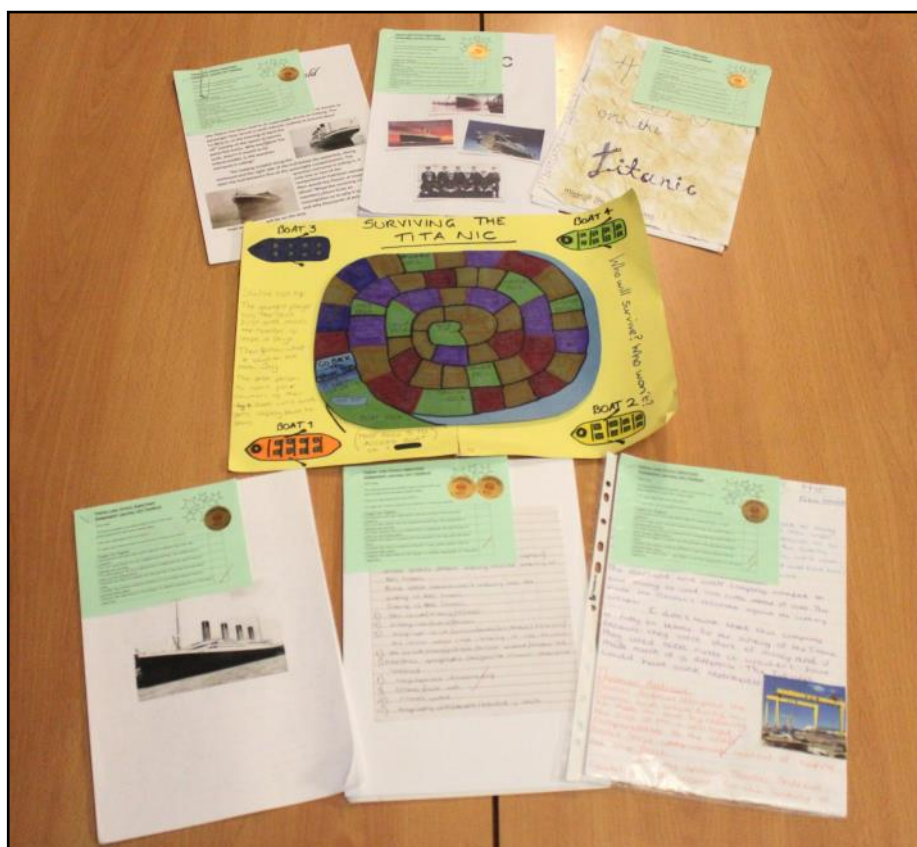
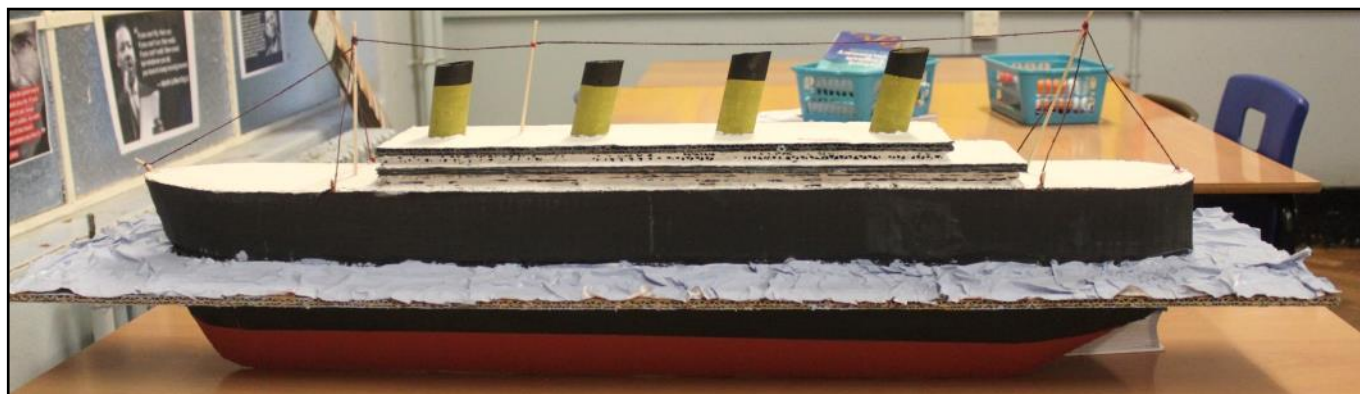

Making the grade!

AS IN recent years, Higham Lane School chalked up a strong set of GCSE examination results in 2017.

Following last year's exceptional performance, which placed Higham Lane in the top 100 non-selective schools in the country, this year 77% of students achieved five or more passes at Grade C or above, including at least Grade 4 in the new English and Mathematics qualifications.

88% of students achieved a grade 4 or above in English, 80% in Maths, 77% in both English and Maths, and 77% in at least two Sciences. A quarter of students achieved five or more A*-A or 7-9 grades. Students, across all abilities, continue to make above national average progress at Higham Lane School.

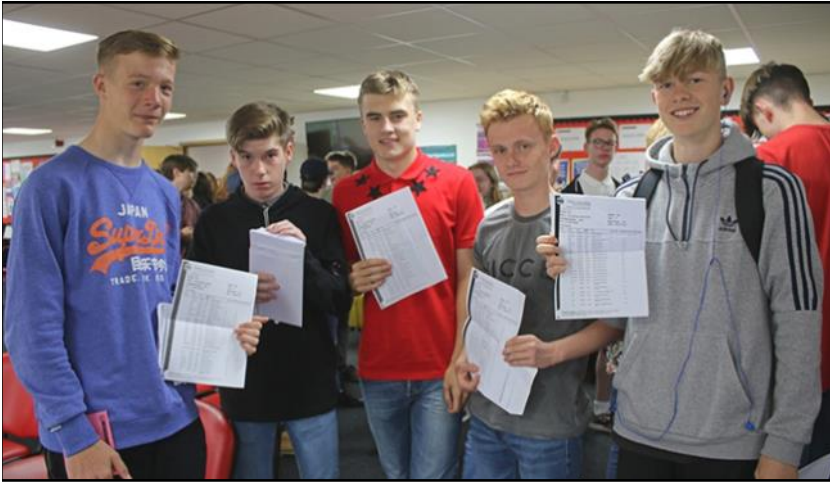

Headteacher, Phil Kelly, commented: "This is our first set of results involving the new-style GCSEs in some subjects which have more challenging content and a different assessment system. The students have worked exceptionally hard and risen to the challenge, effectively supported by a highly-skilled and dedicated team of staff and encouraged by their families/carers. "There are so many excellent individual performances to celebrate. It is evident from these results that, even in an ever-changing educational climate, Higham Lane School delivers excellent outcomes which give all students the opportunity to succeed."

YEAR 10 students enjoyed a very successful Work Experience week in 2017.

Work Experience week took place between July 17-19 when, from a year group of 249 students, 239 went out on 187 different placements.

Most placements were in the Coventry and Warwickshire area, however, out-of-area placements included Leicestershire, Northamptonshire, Derbyshire, Staffordshire, Birmingham, Solihull, Walsall, Manchester and London.

Ten students did not go on Work Experience. One of these completed Work Experience with the Support for Learning department – the rest caught up with their schoolwork, helped with events such as sports days, and received two employability sessions run by a Job Centre representative.

- Enthusiastic, friendly, not afraid to ask questions, very eager to learn.
