The background to the recording of the original track stems from one occasion when Laura was sitting at the piano, playing the chords to Justin Bieber's hit 'Despacio'.

She decided there and then to record a cover of the song with her stepfather, David, which they recorded and produced together prior to it being published on Soundcloud, a music and podcast streaming platform.

Unfortunately, as it was a cover version, the song couldn't be released on any of the big digital music platforms due to copyright/royalty issues.

Inspired by their musical efforts, Laura and David thought it would be a good idea to release an original track, so they set about writing the music and lyrics to a brand new song entitled `AM'

The recording and producing were both carried out in the music room at Laura's home, and David, a keen musician himself, engineered the track using Cubase music production software.

Once completed, a decision was made to release the song on all the big digital distribution platforms, including Apple Music, iTunes, Spotify and Deezer.

Adele and Jess Glynne, now plans to pen and release an entire album of original songs by the end of the year.


Not surprisingly, the talented songstress hopes to study Music as an Option subject in Years 9, 10 and 11!

The trio of girls — Lexie (10H2), Bethany (10H2) and Rosie (10H3) — travelled to the Arden Hotel, in Henley-in-Arden, for the event, where they were pitted against the region's top speakers.

Although they were one of the youngest teams competing, the girls finished third overall, beating off the attentions of other schools and sixth forms from the area.

Bethany, Rosie and Lexie were an inspiration to their families and friends who supported them as they tackled the topic of `Equality'.

Although being last to speak, it did not deter them from

showing their skills and passion on the subject. The judges commented on the ``excellent, detailed and insightful introduction from the chair, and the wide ranging topic of `Equality' being evidenced well and handled effectively by the lead speaker, with team work evident throughout''.

As a result, they finished in a very creditable third place with 90 points, behind Learnington's Trinity Catholic School (98) and Kineton High School (99).

The team's sponsors — Arbury Rotary Club — were extremely pleased as this is the highest-achieving group they have supported over the years.

High praise is deserved as the girls and Mr Smith really showed the other teams that Higham Lane is sitting shoulder-to-shoulder with state/private schools and sixth forms within the West Midlands area.

Drivers asked to curb bad habits!

A POLITE request is being made to drivers of vehicles who park in the vicinity of Higham Lane School.

Please can you all be considerate to our neighbours, other students and parents when parking, and also abide by the Highway Code, which states that:

• Vehicles must not cause an obstruction — this includes parking over dropped kerbs.

• Vehicles must not be parked within 10 metres (32ft) of a junction.

• Vehicles must not stop or park on the zig-zag lines outside the School gates.

• Vehicles partially parking on pavements to avoid causing obstruction should leave enough space for a mobility scooter or double buggy pushchair to get through. This means no vehicle should be parked wholly on the pavement. Anyone seen contravening any of these laws is liable to receive a fixed penalty notice from one of the Police patrols who regularly carry out checks outside the

School in the mornings and afternoons. The Police also receive regular complaints about speeding on the streets surrounding the School, in particular Higham Lane, Weddington Road and Hinckley Road.

Both Weddington Road and Hinckley Road are limited to a maximum of 30mph while the majority of Higham Lane is also restricted to the same urban national speed limit. Please adhere to the speed limits stated by the signs.

There are other schools and several residential properties around these roads, so please be mindful of your speed at all times.



100 Million Minutes Reading Challenge

Year 11 — Your exams on't let this be you... Plan ahead!

THERE'S not long left now until your exams. Have you started revising? The answer should be YES!

If you haven't already done so, you need to start revising NOW – <u>DO NOT LEAVE</u> IT TOO LATE!

Planning ahead will help you achieve your goal.

When are your exams?

• Start by making a list showing the order they come in so you can plan your revision accordingly. If Maths is one of your first exams, make sure it is one of the first subjects you start revising.

• Prioritise the subjects that may need more attention than others.

• Ask for help and attend any catch-up classes that are on offer. You cannot revise something that you do not fully understand.

Make a space for yourself

• Revise somewhere that you won't be distracted.

• Make it comfortable.

• Keep the space tidy and when you take a break, move away from your revision space.

• Turn your phone off while you revise – no social networking! Leave it in another room if you can't trust yourself.

• If you feel silence would help you work better, let others around you know that you are working.

• If silence doesn't help, try playing background music instead, or use some headphones to reduce the risk of outside distractions.

Technique

By now, you should know what revision techniques are out there. The important thing to remember is to use whatever works best for you, regardless of what works best for your friends. These are **YOUR** exams!

Think about using the following:-

- Summary notes.
- Reading out loud when memorising.

- Creating posters and mind maps.
- Highlighting key words for each topic.
- Making revision cards.
- Looking at past exam papers.
- Using different colours (paper/pens).

• Test yourself regularly. This is important. It will help to identify your weak areas and build your confidence as your strengths increase.

Do not work all the time!

It is important to work for around 40 minutes before taking a short break. If you work for too long in one go, your brain will get tired, making it harder to remember all the information.

Eat and sleep well

• Do something in your break. You could call a friend or have something to eat. Use these things as a reward for your hard work before moving on to another topic.

• Get into good habits – go to bed at a reasonable time and make sure you always have breakfast. You cannot

function properly if you haven't had enough food or sleep so make sure you take it seriously.

• Make sure you stay hydrated and drink plenty of water. Stay away from energy drinks. They can give you a boost to begin with, but then make you tired.

Take time to relax.

Think about yourself

• Focus on what you need to do and not what other people are doing. Everyone is different and you must do what is best for YOU.


• Don't be afraid to ask for help. See your teachers, Progress Leader, Learning Mentor, parents/carers or friends.

• Remember that this period of hard work and stress will not last forever!

• Preparing for your exams may seem like a lot of work, but the more prepared you are, the more you will achieve. Your goal is in sight. Strive to achieve your best!

Each time the boys were divided into three seven-a-side teams and played a trio of matches in some very cold conditions.

Overall the teams enjoyed a great deal of success, winning many games.

The **Year 10** football squad won their District Cup quarter-final against Ash Green School 3-2 following a very good team performance and will play Queen Elizabeth in the semi-final.

The **Year 11** football squad has now won the District League for the fifth year in a row — a fantastic achievement! In the Warwickshire Cup, facing yet another away game, they beat Harris 2-1 in a very tough semi-final and are through to the final which will be played on
